I believe that we are collectively appalled by the unnecessary and tragic killing of George Floyd while he was in the hands of those committed to serve and protect. It was another terrible event that requires us to acknowledge that, despite the ideals of freedom and opportunity that helped create this great nation, these ideals are not consistently or fairly applied. This much, we know:

Social, economic, educational, and political advantages from the past are cemented as the often-unconscious privilege of the present. . . .

Systemically, we must unmask social evil and, like prophets, denounce injustice. We must eradicate overt and covert racism. This requires solidarity with those suffering from disadvantages woven into society and our self-perceptions.
