

## 2024 Distinguished Health Law Service Award

The AALS Section on Law, Medicine, and Health Care congratulates Lindsay F. Wiley for being named the recipient of the 2024 Distinguished Health Law Service Award.



Professor Wiley graduated with her undergraduate degree from Harvard College and earned her J.D. from Harvard Law School and her M.P.H. from Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. She currently serves as professor of law at UCLA Law and Faculty Director of the Health Law and Policy Program at UCLA Law. Professor Wiley teaches torts and various health law courses. Her research focuses on access to health care and healthy living conditions in the U.S. and globally. She is the author of *Public Health Law: Power, Duty, Restraint and Public Health Law and Ethics: A Reader* (with Lawrence O. Gostin) and *Feminist Judgments: Health Law Rewritten* (with Seema Mohapatra).

Professor Wiley received this award for her exemplary service to the health law field. She has served in many leadership roles, including as past president of the American Society of Law, Medicine, and Ethics and chair of numerous substantive conferences and initiatives. Through this work, she has helped develop the health justice framework and to expand the health law field to become more inclusive and to center issues of social and racial justice. Professor Wiley is a national expert on public health law issues and has committed significant time to explaining and translating complex public health issues to the lay public via media interviews and her writing, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic. She is the U.S. Rapporteur for the Lex-Atlas COVID-19 Project, a global project comparing responses to Covid-19, sponsored by the University College London, King's College London, and the Max Planck Institute of Comparative Public Law and International Law in Heidelberg, Germany. She is also the Founder and Co-Chair of the Health Justice: Engaging Critical Perspectives in Health Initiative cosponsored by ChangeLab Solutions, LLC, the Institute for Healing Justice and Equity, and the Satcher Health Leadership Institute. She has served as a member of and consultant to committees convened by the National Academies of Science, Engineering, and Medicine related to public health emergency response and federal

communicable disease control powers. She is a current member and incoming chair of the Board of Directors of ChangeLab Solutions, LLC. Professor Wiley is also a former member of the National Conference of Lawyers and Scientists, a joint standing committee of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Bar Association's Section of Science and Technology Law.

Professor Wiley's impact on the field cannot be overstated. As one section member noted, "She spearheaded the field of health justice, fundamentally shaping my scholarly approach through her pioneering work reframing public health law via an ethical lens and cementing equity into legal and policy decisions. As an exceptional mentor, she has advanced my career through generous guidance –modeling intellectual rigor, connecting me with key scholars, supporting my growth as a scholar and teacher, and reassuringly counseling me through the ups and downs along the way." These sentiments were echoed by a number of our colleagues. Another section member noted "Professor Wiley represents everything you could hope for in a scholar, teacher, and colleague." She is simultaneously exceptional and authentic--an internationally recognized expert with robust knowledge while also remaining generous, humble, and curious. She uses her knowledge and experience as gifts for and in service to others, never as a shield or a weapon for selfaggrandizement. She recognizes potential in others and provides them with opportunities wherever she can. Many of us in the section have personally been the beneficiary of her generosity on multiple occasions. On top of her many academic achievements, Professor Wiley is a genuinely kind, thoughtful, and funny person who manages to take her work incredibly seriously while not taking herself too seriously. She is a rare gem, as an academic and as a person. We are all better for her presence in our lives and in this field."

#### Health Law and Policy Program: Recent Events

Future of Health Care Series: The Health Law and Policy Program launched the Future of Health Care Series in January 2023 in partnership with the American Society of Law, Medicine & Ethics and the American Health Law Association. Within a health equity framework, these panel discussions examine trends, challenges, and opportunities in health care and the role of law and policy, highlighting both practitioner and scholar perspectives. New topics will be explored in 2024. • Genomics, AI, and the African Diaspora (November 2023) • LGBTQ+ Health Equity and Access to Gender Affirming Care (October 2023) • Rethinking Health Reform and the Role of Medicaid in Advancing Health Equity (April 2023) • Health Care Through the Lens of Health Equity (January 2023).

Health, Equity, and Law after *Dobbs*: The Health Law and Policy Program, American University Center on Health, Risk & Society, The George Washington Law School, and The George Washington University Milken Institute School of Public Health, in partnership with the American Society of Law, Medicine & Ethics, presented "Health, Equity, and Law after *Dobbs*" in February 2023. This interdisciplinary conference brought together experts to examine the legal, medical, public health, and sociological aftermath of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*. By assembling an interdisciplinary group of researchers, practitioners, and advocates, the conference provided a fuller picture of both the impact of the law on the books and the realities of the law on the ground. The conference helped scholars, practitioners, advocates, and students understand current policy and practice related to abortion, as well as the reverberating effects of the *Dobbs* decision on the delivery of health care and society more broadly. It also aimed to develop a research agenda and a broader strategic focus for advancing more equitable access to reproductive health care in the long term.

*Center News.* The Petrie-Flom Center for Health Law Policy, Biotechnology, and Bioethics welcomed a new Executive Director in June 2023. Susannah Baruch. J.D. joined the Petrie-Flom Center as an experienced Executive Director, with expertise in health law policy and ethics and a particular interest in reproduction, genetics, and women's health. Former

Executive Director Carmel Shachar stepped down to join the Center for Health Law and Policy Innovation at Harvard Law School, where she serves as assistant clinical professor of law and faculty director of the Health Law and Policy Clinic.

The Petrie-Flom Center received support for the expansion of two signature research initiatives. First, in October 2023, the Center announced a new gift from the Gracias Family Foundation, which supports and expands the work that the Center began with the Project on Psychedelics Law and Regulation (POPLAR) at the Petrie-Flom Center. Other areas of specific pride for the Petrie-Flom Center also include increased digital media and event presence, our connection to Harvard Law School students, and the robust inclusion of the Center's experts in media coverage. Our successful digital symposia program explored diverse topics, including public health's past, present, and future and reproductive technologies and workplace equality. Our blog received over a million unique visitors this year and was quoted or linked to by outlets such as the *New York Times*, *The Atlantic*, *LA Times*, *Vox*, and *Bloomberg*. Center affiliates also were quoted and interviewed by leading media outlets including the *New Yorker*, the *Boston Globe*, *NPR*, and *STAT*.

*Upcoming Initiatives.* The Petrie-Flom Center is looking forward to our annual conference, focusing on The Law and Policy of Psychedelic Medicine, which we hope will also lead to an edited volume. *New Faculty Hires*: Alice Setrini joined the Health Justice Project as a Clinical Teaching Fellow in July 2023. Prior to joining Loyola, Alice served as the executive director of the Jaharis Health Law Institute at DePaul College of Law.

Loyola University Chicago School of Law's Health Justice Project (HJP): The HJP continues to address the health harming legal needs of vulnerable patients in Chicago and its near western suburbs through its medical-legal partnerships with Erie Family Health Centers and Loyola Medicine and Loyola's Stritch School of Medicine. As part of the HJP, faculty and students engage in outreach to communities, educate health care partners on legal issues impacting health and well-being, and engage in direct civil legal services and upstream advocacy to address the social, legal and systems issues that present barriers to good health and health equity. As part of the HJP Clinic, teams of law, medical, and social work students obtained dismissals of two deportation cases against families fleeing cartel violence in Mexico, obtained guardianships to support the care of adults and minors with disabilities, ensured coverage for life altering medications for a child with disabilities, and sustained of secured Medicaid, SNAP, and supplemental social security income benefits (SSI) benefits for clients. The HJP continued to support the Illinois Medical Legal Partnership Task Force, bringing MLP advocates from across the state together for collaboration, training, and information sharing and has developed and monitors the MLP Illinois website.

Community Equity Response Collaborative Loyola (CERCL): HJP continues as a lead with CERCL, formerly the COVID Equity Response Collaborative, a network of Loyola students and faculty in medicine, public health, and nursing addressing the unmet needs of communities disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 and other health disparities, but under resourced with necessary supports and services. CERCL continues to work with community partners in Maywood, Illinois, the site of Loyola University's Health Sciences Campus, and neighboring communities in the near western suburbs of Cook County to address health equity issues through its Community Engagement Fellowship program, a ten-week program which brings together interdisciplinary teams students and faculty from across a wide variety or Loyola University programs and campuses to learn about health equity issues in the near western suburbs of Chicago and to partner with community organizations to engage in research and project and policy development to address health inequities. CERCL affiliate faculty also support community organizations and agencies with research and programmatic support to address health disparities.

Center News: NSU Law was pleased this year to continue its tradition of interdisciplinary cooperation between students and faculty at the multiple colleges within the university, including those comprising its Health Professions Division. Professors and students in NSU Law and NSU College of Allopathic Medicine came together to host "Making an Impact in Law and Medicine," an event where over a hundred high school students from underrepresented minorities came together to learn about the intersection of law and medicine and potential careers in this area. NSU Law continued to develop this community outreach by creating a new program titled, "Advancing Underrepresented Youth in Law & Medicine" where, under the training of the faculty, law and medical students will host several seminars at a local high school campus to teach and mentor high school students about how to prepare for law or medical school and how these two professions intersect to improve care and reduce health care disparities. NSU Law students also collaborated with the students in the Physician Assistant program to engage in interprofessional combined class sessions on HIPAA, Privacy, Fraud and Abuse, and Disability Law compliance. Additionally, all were able to participate and exchange perspectives in "Examining Health Care Fraud and Fraud Trends," the law school's fourth annual Jay A. Ziskind Health Law Lecture Series in October 2023. The Disability Inclusion and Advocacy Law Clinic (DIAL Clinic), funded by the Taft Foundation, received an approximately two million dollar grant over four years which gives the DIAL Clinic the ability to expand its services to the disability community. The DIAL Clinic has

transitioned into a full-scale Disability Rights Law Clinic focusing on Civil Rights Law, Education Law, Housing Discrimination, Parental Rights for Adults with Disabilities, Employment Discrimination, Guardianship Law, and benefits. The DIAL Clinic has been lauded on local and national news for its effective advocacy for the disability community. The DIAL Clinic hosted an exhibitor's booth at the State of Florida Family Café to answer legal questions to the thousands of people with disabilities and their families present. The DIAL Clinic will host a Guardian Advocacy Workshop for parents and young adults with disabilities to learn about guardianship alternatives and to spread the legal word about guardian advocacy. Center for Health Law Studies Highlights: SLU Law adds Jamille Fields Allsbrook to the Center for Health Law Studies Faculty. We are pleased to announce the appointment of Fields Allsbrook, a health law and policy expert, to the faculty beginning in July of 2023. Most recently, she served as a senior policy advisor in the Office of Population Affairs in the United States Department of Health and Human Services. She has past experience at the Center for American Progress as the director of women's health and rights. She focuses much of her

research and scholarship on health equity and health outcomes in maternal health for Black women. She has published her policy research with the Center for American Progress and Health Affairs. • Robert Gatter, director of the Center for Health Law Studies, has spent much of his time since the COVID-19 pandemic focusing on the improvement of public health laws and policies. He served as the reporter for the Uniform Law Commission (ULC) focusing on a model state law for public health emergency powers. As the Reporter, Gatter performed the legal research to frame and inform the Committee's deliberations and drafted iterations of the model law as the Committee developed its final version. The model law was put forward to the entire voting body of the ULC and was approved at its annual meeting, which was held at the end of July in Honolulu, Hawaii. • Kelly Gillespie is a nationally recognized expert in drug policy with practical experience in pain management care. Gillespie focuses her scholarship on the law and policy of substance abuse disorder and of opioid prescribing. She is the co-author of an amicus brief in the recent United States Supreme Court case, Ruan v United States that examined a physician's responsibility in the overprescribing of opioids. The Court's ruling ultimately aligned with Gillespie's brief, stating that the crime of prescribing controlled substances outside the usual course of practice requires that the defendant "knowingly or intentionally" acted in an unlawful manner. • Michael Sinha focused much of his scholarship this year on pharmaceutical law and policy. He published a piece in the American University Law Review on the regulation of the generic pharmaceutical industry. He also published an article entitled "Court Intrusion Into Science and Medicine the Mifepristone Decision" in the widely read Journal of the American Medical Association. The article was written in conjunction with Daniel Aaron, MD, JD and Teneille Brown, JD both of the University of Utah's S.J. Quinney College of Law. • Sidney D. Watson, professor and scholar in residence, continued her work on improving access to health care through legislative initiatives and new opportunities for legal advocacy.
