Dennis Kennedy and Kirsten Davis

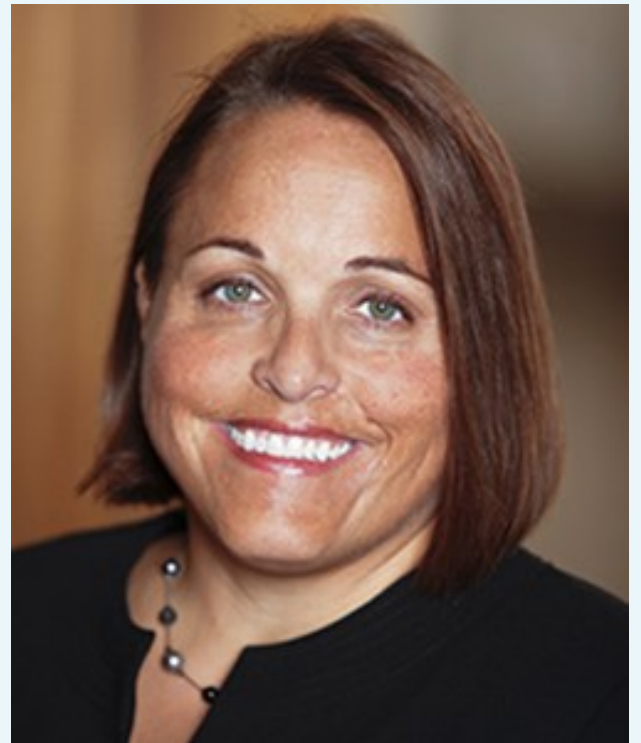
Dennis Kennedy
