

What is reasonable regarding the landlord's right to show a property?

I've notified my landlord that I'll be moving out in 3 months, when my lease is up.

He has started showing the apartment to potential tenants, but he refuses to give me any notice before showings.

I've asked for 24 hours notice before a showing, but the landlord won't agree. He doesn't even ask whether a time is convenient for me, he just shows up and he lets himself in if I'm not there.

Is there anything in the law about what is considered reasonable notice of a showing? Is there anything I can do to make him give me at least 24 hours notice, and to stop him from entering if I'm not there?

Also, are there any rules about how many showings to future tenants there can be? I feel like I have no privacy any more.



How does Mass Legal Answers Online/ ABA Free Legal Answers work?

Mass Legal Answers Online is based on the walk-in clinic or dial-a-lawyer model where clients request brief advice and counsel about a specific civil legal issue from a volunteer lawyer. Lawyers provide information and basic legal advice through the website without any expectation of long-term representation. All communication between the client and the attorney takes place via a secure website.

How do clients sign up for and use the site?

Users who meet eligibility requirements (see Eligibility below) sign the user agreement online, create a username and password, post a request for legal advice and provide facts about their case. Users are asked to select a category (such as "housing" or "debts") that best describes their question. They provide their name and the name of the opposing party, if known. Users are informed that there is no guarantee that their question will be answered.
